UPDATE ON SEASONS OF GIVING

Destructive Natural Disaster has a silver lining at Jennett Heritage Area

One of Story County Conservation's (SCC) wildlife areas, Jennett Heritage Area (south of Nevada along S-14) was in the direct path of the EF-2 tornado that struck on May 21, 2024. The storm destroyed nearly every tree at Jennett including the beloved Bald Eagle's nest many have watched from afar.

A gnarled mess of storm debris posed risks to public safety and created log jams downstream, while posing challenges to future management of the Jennett property.

Damaged trees and debris have recently been removed, as is noticeable from S-14. Very few trees are left standing on the property; however, a few desirable trees like white oaks were spared along West Indian Creek. Many of the damaged trees removed were "weedy" or invasive species like white mulberry and honeysuckle, growing thick enough they had shaded out the understory. This left bare soil, leading to erosion and water quality concerns.

So, what's the silver-lining? The storm and clean-up provided SCC the opportunity to restore the property to its historical nature—a continuous grassland. Disturbed areas from debris removal have already been sown with a native prairie seed mix. Removal of invasive trees will mean less seed sources of invasive plant species able to be carried downstream. Also, Jennett will become more desirable to many imperiled native grassland birds, including Henslow's sparrows and Bobolinks, who avoid nesting near trees, because trees equal predators. A favorite naturalized bird species — pheasants — will also likely benefit. For Jennett Heritage Area, the future should hold a more diverse ecosystem, improved water quality, and improved recreational opportunities.

So, what about the fate of the displaced eagles? Sadly, the tornado claimed the lives of the eaglets that were in the nest at the time, but the surviving adult eagle pair didn't go far and have built a new home just outside Jennett—on the other side of S-14, still visible from the roadway. If we are lucky, perhaps we may all spend this spring watching from afar as these resilient raptors raise their next brood of young.

Service and Science: A Partnership in Learning

Service learning is a vital part of students' educational experience across the district. Each year, 8th grade students participate in meaningful projects that connect them with different age groups and members of the community. In the fall, they visit all five nursing homes and assisted living facilities in Nevada, delivering hand-painted pumpkins, handmade cards, and sharing jokes to brighten the residents' day. In the spring, they dedicate their time to supporting the Special Olympics. This year, the students wanted to add a new project that allowed them to engage with a younger audience. Thus, a partnership with the multi-age 1st- and 2nd-grade students was formed, creating an opportunity for mentorship, collaboration, and fun learning.

The Inspiration Behind the Project

The service learning projects are deeply connected to Capturing Kids' Hearts Leadworthy lessons, which focus on character development. Each month, students explore a new CKH term, which in February was Kindness. Around the same time, the MA 1-2 teachers expressed interest in incorporating cooperative learning into their science curriculum. This alignment of kindness and collaborative learning sparked the idea for their newest project.

The teachers developed a theme, selected age-appropriate materials, and planned engaging activities. After introducing the idea to the 8th-grade students, teachers sent an open call for volunteers interested in becoming "student teachers" in which 27 students stepped up to the challenge. These students took on the responsibility of leading four different stations, each covering a unique science concept. Once the student teachers were selected, they worked in groups to plan lessons during their lunch breaks and Cub Pride time. They demonstrated incredible dedication and leadership with less than two weeks to prepare.

Day of Learning and Fun

On the day of the project, the student teachers arrived early to set up their stations. Shortly after, the rest of the 8th graders arrived and were paired with their MA 1-2 buddies. The excitement was evident as introductions were made and the learning stations came to life. The four learning stations included:

Winter Yoga and Stretching

Students explored movement through winter animal-themed yoga poses. The student teachers created posters with fun facts about each animal, making the session both interactive and informative. The group ended with a game of Duck, Duck, Goose, a highlight for both big and little buddies.



Hibernation, Migration, and Adaptation

Here, the younger students learned about these three survival strategies. They were given mini books to read with their big buddy, reinforcing reading skills and encouraging mentorship.





Life Cycle of a Snowflake

Students learned about the formation of snowflakes and then collaborated to make a life-cycle booklet. They also designed their own snowflakes by painting with saltwater, creating unique crystallized patterns once dried.

Polar Bears

At this station, students discovered interesting facts about polar bears before creating a polar bear puppet. The activity required teamwork, as the 8th graders helped guide their younger buddies through the crafting process.



Each session lasted about 25-30 minutes before groups rotated to a new station. Throughout the morning, smiles and laughter filled the room as students of different ages worked together. The younger students were eager to learn their science standards focus on understanding how plants and animals use their external parts to survive, grow, and meet their needs, as well as observation, description, and prediction of patterns in the movement of objects in the sky. The 8th graders embraced their roles as mentors and leaders. By the end of the event, both groups had gained valuable experiences—whether it was practicing patience and guidance or discovering new scientific concepts in a hands-on environment.

The Impact of Service Learning

This project reinforced the importance of connection and community engagement. By incorporating service learning throughout the year, these experiences broaden students' perspectives and help instill a lifelong commitment to kindness and community involvement. The success of this new initiative highlights the power of mentorship and interactive learning. Nevada is excited to continue expanding service opportunities that allow our students to grow academically, socially, and emotionally while making a meaningful impact on those around them.

PTA Hosts Carnival

The Nevada PTA successfully sponsored another amazing Carnival at Central Elementary. Cassie Rutherford, PTA president, worked tirelessly on this event with her crew of helpers. During the carnival, students moved from room to room to play games earning tickets to turn in at the end of the evening for prizes. This year a fun new addition was a magician. He was amazing and kept the students and parents engaged and laughing throughout his performance. Another big hit was Mike Emery's ice cream cart, with a long line throughout the night! Wristbands for the carnival were \$20 which allowed students to play unlimited games all night. The PTA also donated a number of wristbands to families who might not have been able to attend otherwise.

This event is the largest fundraiser to support the school. The PTA uses the funds raised for free events such as: VIP & Me Glow event, VIP & Me Snowflake Dance, STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art



and Math) event, 5th and 6th skate afternoons, 7th/8th Mixer, teacher conference meals, preschool T-shirts, teacher appreciation, two \$750 scholarships for post-high school education for graduating seniors, and the book fairs. They also donate money to all three schools for field trips and funds to support their teachers.

Oak Park Estates Trail project to connect 6th Street and 8th Street

A project that will increase safety for pedestrians and bike riders wanting to get back and forth from the southwest part of town to north of Highway 30 over the new overpass bridge will happen this year.

The City Council passed a design and construction phase services contract with City Consulting Engineers HR Green in February for the trail extension. HR Green said the goal will be to complete design and bid the project in



mid-2025, with construction completed by end of 2025.

In HR Green's design drawing above, the gray indicates how the trail and

existing pavement can be utilized to travel through the Oak Park Estates addition to get to 8th Street or 6th Street and to access the City's trail system at 8th Street.



Springtime open burn season is back: April 1 through May 15

As you start your outside cleaning, the Nevada Public Safety Department reminds you of City of Nevada Ordinance 105.05 about open burning.

Springtime open burning season for yard waste is April 1 through May 15, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. each day.



ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

It is important to remember these additional requirements to comply with the law and to remain safe while burning yard waste:

• Yard waste must be 40 feet from any structure (including wooden fences and utility poles).

• An approved incinerator for yard waste is permitted no closer than 15 feet from structures.

• Burn barrels are not approved for burning rubbish or yard

waste.

- An adult must attend any fire until it is completely out.
- You must have a source of extinguishment near the open fire; one suggestion a garden hose.
- Flammable liquids shall not be used to start or aid fires. Moreover, it's just a bad idea.
- You may not burn in the street or alley.

Please respect your neighbors when burning. Never burn when it's windy or conditions are not absolutely perfect for burning. We recommend informing your neighbors when you intend to burn, so they do not inadvertently call the fire department.

Those who violate this ordinance will face a first offense fine of \$300, with court costs of \$95. No fire is worth this, so burn at the appropriate times and within the dates provided. If you have questions about the burning ordinance, contact Fire Chief Ray Reynolds at 515-382-4593.
