Tradition in Nevada is to have a flag raising and introduction of military inductees at the old courthouse, now Story Administration Building, on 6th Street, followed by a processional on Lincoln Highway to the cemetery, with a service and speaker at the city cemetery. 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

Nevada business continues growth

As OnTrack Construction moves into its eighth year in business, CEO/Owner Matt Runge believes the future holds not only continued growth for his business, but also an increasing ability for his company to support the community and important causes.

"We like to give," Runge said, but more importantly, he added, "we want our contributions to make an impact."

OnTrack, which specializes in underground sewer and water main construction, has made an impact in the local community, giving substantial support to events like Pizza Pie Looza, Nevada Community Rodeo, Swinging for a Cure leukemia fundraiser, and other school and community causes. The recent Valentine's Day dinner/concerts at Gatherings with featured country singers were supported by OnTrack.

"Some of our giving back is about supporting activities that give local people things to do here," Runge said. He also likes that in many cases, OnTrack is working with or supporting smaller businesses in the community through these events.

All of this "giving" certainly impacts a company's bottom line, and that's why Runge thinks about the company's ability to give in each circumstance. But what you often can't see, he noted, is the intangible benefits that come from being involved and supporting your community.

"There was a time when people here didn't know who we were. Then you start showing support for the community, and show that you're rooted in the community, and people start to know that you are

here and that you are going to be here," he said.

Three years ago, Runge was featured in a local business story after opening his new office structure in the West Industrial Park, and much has been happening in the past three years.

Take for instance the 24 acres the company purchased in the West Park, not only for its own future growth, but to potentially sell to other businesses that would become their closest neighbors. "We subdivided the property and put in a road and infrastructure, and we now have sold one lot to a business that will supply 'contractors' condo' units." Construction of the building for that business is complete.

Runge said he plans to sell two more lots, but will keep the rest of the land for On-Track, because it's definitely growing.

In the final quarter of 2024, OnTrack started a new business, Highmark Trucking, which is a separate entity, born out of a need OnTrack was seeing. "We were hiring so many trucks to haul dirt and rock, so we decided to jump in with a couple trucks of our own," he said.

Along with dump trucks, they added a specialty vac truck and trailer, which will primarily be used to locate buried utilities. "These are high dollar trucks, and we

got ours late last year. We plan to grow this part of our business because of the need for vac services."

Runge is also proud of a grant that On-Track received which paid much of the cost to put in a solar field just north of the building. "That will greatly reduce our monthly power bills and any extra power it produces will go back on the grid," he said.

The company is also seeing employment growth, up about 10 employees (they are now between 35 and 45) in the past three years. "We're also exploring the idea of adding a concrete division to pour streets, driveways, and sidewalks. This will add more employees."

It's the core group of employees that make what Runge is doing today more enjoyable than when he first started his business. "I've learned that putting people in roles and making sure you step back and not micro-manage ... puts you a lot further ahead. Let them do their job and grow." Runge also enjoys the implementation of an "idea" initiative that was started at his company, challenging employees to provide input of new ideas, big or small, that all help to keep the company moving forward.

OnTrack is doing business all over Central lowa and its employee base is from all over this region.

As far as choosing Nevada as the company's home, Runge has no regrets. "Nevada has been great. It's a friendly place to have a business." He also noted that building a new headquarters in Nevada was much more affordable than if he'd done so in the Des Moines metro area.

With May being the month of celebrating Economic Development Week (May 11-17), Nevada Economic Development Director Brenda Dryer believes Runge and OnTrack Construction are a shining example of a business that is doing great things.

"We are grateful that they call Nevada home and continue to invest in their people and our community," Dryer said.

CREATES A PLACE TO REFLECT

For those who enjoy fishing in Nevada's community ponds, you may wonder, "Who is Denny's Dock — located at the pond along 19th Street — named for?"

Its namesake is Dennis R. Skinner, who was a local businessman with a legacy of giving back.

Denny, as everyone called him, owned a local accounting/ finance business, and was a husband, a father and grandfather, a friend, and a devout Rotarian. He spent most of his youth in Perry, Iowa, where he met his future wife, Kathy. Both graduates of Perry High School, the two attended Iowa State University, where they married while still students. That marriage was 55 years strong at the time of Denny's passing on May 30, 2023.

Kathy remembered living at Pammel Court with their cute baby girl. "We were extremely poor. I worked every night at the lowa State library, and Denny had several jobs with different departments. But it was a good time."

After graduating, the two left lowa to pursue the "California Dream, whatever that was," she said. Denny worked for Bank of America. But after a year in California, they returned to Iowa. "We missed the green grass and black dirt and our families," Kathy said.

Denny worked several banking jobs, returned to Drake for his Master's Degree, and eventually started his own financial business in Nevada in 1980. They lived southwest of Nevada in the rural area. Their children, Emmi and Josh, attended Nevada

Schools, so Denny chose Nevada as the community where he could become involved, and Nevada Rotary became an important part of his life. "It was through Rotary that he realized what he could do for people here and around the world," Kathy said.

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Rotary is one of several wonderful civic clubs that people can belong to in Nevada. Rotary International is a world-wide organization, and Denny was committed to the success of Rotary locally and in Iowa. He held officer positions in the Nevada club and was also elected as a District Governor for the broader region of Rotary in 2003-04.

His wife and daughter Emmi, also members of Nevada Rotary, say Denny very much enjoyed helping others become leaders in the organization, taking a page from his own Rotary mentor, Willis Shaw's playbook. "Willis, as a secretary for the local group, served as a stable, guiding force and was impactful," Kathy said. Even though Denny had held higher offices, in more recent years, he preferred to serve as the Nevada club's secretary where he could continue to mentor newer members.

One of those he mentored was Christa Skaggs, past president of Nevada Rotary. "To this day I am still learning about some of his initiatives for both our local community and globally," Christa said. "To know Denny was to appreciate his remarkable character; he truly embodied integrity. He was a humble guy with a warm smile and a genuine commitment to service. Although I am only familiar with a fraction of his extensive contributions, it is evident that most of his impactful work was carried out behind the scenes."

Denny's wife and daughter echo what Christa said, admitting there wasn't much said about Denny's accomplishments while he was alive, because he preferred to do things quietly. "He never asked for accolades," Emmi said.

Kathy believes one of Denny's most impactful contributions to Rotary was starting a Jr. Rotarian program at Nevada, the only one in the state. "Those youth have enlivened the local club," Kathy said.

Outside of Rotary and his business, Denny enjoyed spending time with his family, especially his daughter, his son, and his grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He also had two major pastimes he loved, riding his Harley Davidson and fishing, both of which came with his love of traveling.

Kathy said fishing was something he had done with his father and brother for many years, going to a place they loved in Canada. Denny enjoyed taking his son and grandsons to that same fishing spot. Kathy and Emmi laugh about how little they knew about what happened on those fishing trips. All that the men would ever say about their trips was that they fished and talked about fishing. Christa Skaggs knew about Denny's love of fishing, and as the Rotary Club made plans for sponsoring the pond along 19th Street, which has been designated, "Rotary Pond," Christa was planning a special remembrance to honor Denny.

"There was no better way to remember him," Christa said. "It was evident that, aside from his family, Denny had a strong passion for three primary activities, Rotary, fishing and riding his motorcycle with his SABA group. The dock is particularly significant, as it allows us to honor him by incorporating all of his passions, Rotary, fishing, and it was built by Rhett Faaborg, Denny's close friend, who was part of the SABA motorcycle group."

The Rotary club has plans for a few more amenities at the pond. Residents are encouraged to watch for those additions.

Kathy, Emmi and Josh say they feel "honored" with the Rotary Club remembering Denny with the dock. "He would have loved it," Emmi said. And with the pond being not far from the office that Denny once worked in and where Emmi now works, she sometimes walks to the pond and sits at Denny's Dock for a few quiet moments. "I know if he were still alive, he'd be there often," she added.

Denny's Dock is located at the pond behind the Field House along 19th Street.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN NEW YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Starting a Youth Leadership program has been on Main Street Nevada's list of goals. Last month we graduated our first class! This wasn't just a Nevada project, however. Report a Crossing

CITIZENS' INPUT IS NECESSARY FOR RAILROAD OFFICIALS TO PRIORITIZE REPAIRS/CHANGES

At each railroad crossing in Nevada, you will find a little blue sign with two important numbers. The phone number is consistent on every sign: 1-800-848-8715. Keep that phone number handy.

The "X-ing" number is unique to each crossing location, and when you call in to report a problem or emergency, you need to give the "X-ing" number for the location you are referring to. You may also go directly to this website to make a report: https://www.up.com/aboutup/reference/whotocall/.

Why does the City of Nevada, IA, want you to pay attention to these numbers and keep the toll-free phone number handy on your phone?

Because Union Pacific officials tell us that crossings which have more citizen-reported problems, concerns and/or complaints are more likely to be prioritized for repairs and/ or attention by the railroad.

If you feel that things are getting rough or unsafe at one of the Nevada crossings, report the crossing (X-ing) number by phone or through the website link given above. Here is a list of the crossing numbers for your reference (note, each number contains six numerals and one letter):

Let's Talk Tree Trimming

Residents do have a responsibility when it comes to their trees, especially those trees that are in what's called the "parking" space, which is the part of the street, avenue or highway that is not covered by sidewalk and lies between the lot line and the curb line; or on unpaved streets, that part of the street, avenue or highway lying between the lot line and the portion of the street usually traveled by vehicles.

By ordinance (151.03 DUTY TO TRIM

TREES) the requirements of tree trimming are outlined in the City Code.

Here is the basic guideline:

Property owners must trim the trees on their property that overhang the street so that all branches are at least **15 feet** above the surface of the street and **8 feet** above the surface of any sidewalks.

If you fail to keep your trees trimmed as the ordinance requires, the City may serve you a notice that you have



FIVE days to do so. At that point, if you do not trim, the City may do the trimming and assess you the cost.

Trail System Safety

With spring and warmer weather approaching, we want to stress a few trail safety/use items for the public.

• **Allowed Uses:** The trail system is for pedestrian and bicycle traffic only. No golf carts or UTVs are allowed on the trails.

- **Respect Other Users:** Be aware of other trail users and yield the right-of-way when necessary.
- **Stay on the Trail:** Stick to designated paths to prevent erosion and minimize environmental impact.
- **Control Your Pace:** Use safe speeds and be mindful of other users, especially around corners or in areas with limited visibility.
- **Mind Your Pets:** Keep pets leashed and under control. Pick up any waste from your pet.
- **Be Alert:** Pay attention to your surroundings and be aware of potential hazards. Be aware of blind spots along the trail and slow down as you approach curves, corners, bridges, etc.
- **Communicate:** Use clear communication, such as calling out when passing or using a bell on a bike, to alert others of your presence.
- Yield to Uphill Traffic: If you encounter someone going uphill, yield to them.
- **Stand Aside:** If you are stopped on the trail, please stand aside so others can safely get past.


On Sunday afternoon, there will be a tour of Evergreen Lane.

Beem to be honored this year



Cal (pictured) was born in Clome, S.D. His family moved frequently when he was a child, living in South Dakota, Missouri, and Iowa. He spent his high school years in Ferguson, Iowa.

Cal was attending a motion picture with his parents in Marshalltown when he heard about the Pearl Harbor bomb attack. He knew he wanted to fight, but he was too young. Once he turned 18, he quit school in his senior year to enlist. He wanted to enlist in the Marines, but their quota was full, so he chose the Navy.

Basic training was at the Farragut Naval Training station near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. He was later assigned to the LST 454 and the South Pacific Theater. The LST (Landing Ship Tank) was designed to land directly on the shore, to unload troops and equipment without the need for piers or cranes. This was a new idea in naval warfare and was part of the 7th Amphibious Force. Cal's job on ship was diesel mechanic in the engine room. His battle station was on the 20mm point gun on the starboard side of the ship.

Cal and the LST 454 participated with invasions in New Guinea, the Admirality Islands, Hollandia, Leyte and Lingayen Gulf in the Phillipines, ending with the Balikpapan operation in Indonesia. With



a total of 23 invasions, the LST 454 earned eight battle stars.

Once the LST 454 was retired, Cal was assigned to the LCI 639, another amphibious ship in the South Pacific. Here he supervised a group of new recruits that they took to Quam on a munitions operation. Cal left the Navy in January 1946 and returned to Iowa.

Cal was a farmer for many years in the Marshalltown area, making his first connection with Nevada through Hertz Farm Management. He later worked at Fisher Controls in Marshalltown, where he met and married his wife, Linda. They have a combined family of five children, 12 grandchildren, and 23 great-grandchildren. They moved to Nevada in 1982, where Cal established a small lawn business. They became involved in their community. Cal has served on the City Council and has been commander of both the American Legion Post and the VFW Post. He and fellow veterans worked to establish the Nevada Community Flag Replacement Fund to help keep the flags flying in Nevada. He still is a member of their board and attends their quarterly meetings. In addition, he is still active in the Nevada Patriotic Council. However, having recently observed his 100th birthday, Cal now prefers to spend his time on more leisurely activities, such as relaxing with his wife and family while traveling and cruising.


Focus on Public Service
